1. President's Address

PHT President Lim Gaik Siang called the virtual meeting to order at 3.00pm and extended her warm welcome to the members. She thanked the members for embracing the technological changes made to accommodate the virtual AGM during the COVID-19 crisis.

Gaik Siang delivered her address, first by expressing her disappointment that most of the planned activities were cancelled due to the Movement Control Order (MCO), and hoped for improvement in the situation and the resumption of activities. She then proceeded to highlight the important advocacy work taken, in providing inputs to the revised George Town Special Area Plan and the Penang Hill Special Area Plan. She also expressed her regret over the loss of LHTA awardee N.B. Samarasena, and special awardee Lee Beng Chuan, and the selection of a new awardee to fill the vacancy.

2. Confirmation of Minutes of Penang Heritage Trust Annual General Meeting 2019

The minutes to the 2020 PHT AGM were read by Hon. Secretary Ben Wismen. The minutes were proposed for adoption, with amendments, by Annelies Allain (L-26001) and seconded by Jean-Pierre Allain (L-26992).

Item 6.1 was amended to read: Annelies brought to the attention of the meeting on the refurbishment of the Town Hall, with visible turrets installed to facilitate the draining of rain water from the building. Khoo Salma and Lim Gaik Siang clarified that although rainwater harvesting is a required measure advocated by the Department of Irrigation and Drainage, the SAP has a clause to exempt heritage buildings from retrofitting with down pipes and rainwater harvesting facilities.

3. Penang Heritage Trust Annual Report 2020

Hon. Secretary Ben Wismen presented the PHT Annual Report as of 31st May 2021.

3.1 Membership Report

- 3.1.1 PHT registered 251 members as of 31st May 2021, with the following breakdown of the membership: 14 Founding Members, 137 Life Members, 98 Ordinary Members, and 2 Student Members.
- 3.1.2 The decline in membership was attributed to the reduced number of activities carried out in 2020 and 2021, due to the nationwide lockdowns.

3.2 Programmes and Projects

3.2.1 PHT Living Heritage Treasures Awards (LHTA)

PHT thanked Chris Ong and George Town Heritage Hotels (GTHH) for the continued support to fund the LHTA program. On 7th July 2020, a special award was presented to handmade joss stick maker Mr Lee Beng Chuan, in recognition of his craft and contributions to the Penang intangible cultural heritage. PHT noted, with sadness, the passing of Mr Lee later in 2020, but also expressed hope in the continuation of the trade by his son.

PHT also noted the passing of N.B. Samarasena, the Sinhalese jeweller, in India a year ago. An open call for nominations was initiated, and a panel of expert judges was engaged to select a new awardee to fill the vacancy. The panel of judges then unanimously agreed to

award Dato' Seri Dr. Anwar Fazal, civil activist and the Father of Malaysian NGOs, as the new LHTA awardee.

3.2.2 Penang Apprenticeship Programme for Artisan (PAPA)

Two workshops were conducted under the PAPA banner to further promote the cultural diversity found in Penang. The workshops conducted were:

- a. Wood carving workshop (for beginners) 28 March 2021
- b. Handmade joss stick workshop 10 April 2021

Ben Wismen urged members to propose ideas and artisans of interest to PAPA for more workshops in the future

3.2.3 Site Visits

PHT only managed to conduct one site visit during this period, as most of the country was under lockdown for the pandemic. On 24 April 2021, a trishaw ride event was organized, led by Mr. Yeap Peng Hoe, to visit heritage assets within George Town. The event was organized as fundraising to support local trishaw riders who had lost their income during the pandemic.

3.2.4 PHT Public Talks

No public talks were organised within the reporting period due to the nationwide lockdowns. PHT informed the meeting of plans to organise virtual talks in the near future.

3.2.5 Monthly Tours

The free monthly tour to Northam Road Protestant Cemetery, conducted by PHT Council Member Clement Liang, has been put on hold since March 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, with resumption plans fully dependent on government guidelines.

3.3 Advocacy Matters

3.3.1 George Town Special Area Plan

Gaik Siang informed the meeting that she has been participating in roundtable sessions to provide her feedback and inputs to a revised George Town Special Area Plan. She hoped that the inputs provided will be able to influence a revision that is sympathetic and protects the integrity and status of George Town as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

3.3.2 Penang Hill Special Area Plan

Ben Wismen informed the meeting that he had, on behalf of PHT, submitted feedback to object proposed redevelopment on Penang Hill, including a helipad, a flagstaff and a cable car. Chee Kit represented the organisation in a virtual call to present the objections, and was acknowledged by PLAN Malaysia.

3.4 Human Resources

3.4.1 Staff and Office Administration

The PHT council members thanked Ms Sariel Leong for her contributions to the office prior to her resignation in August 2020, and welcomed Mr. Chow Chee Kit as the new

administrative executive as replacement. PHT recorded its acknowledgement to all volunteers who had supported PHT, especially during the lockdowns, and the support given to adapt to new protocols in organising activities.

3.5 Adoption of Report

The activity report was proposed for adoption by Jean-Pierre Allain (L-26992) and was seconded by Dato' Anwar Fazal (L-26034)

4. Penang Heritage Trust Financial Report 2019

PHT Hon. Treasurer Derek Loo presented the financial activities and report as of 31st December 2020.

PHT maintained its segregation of funds to General Accumulated Fund and Project Fund. For 2020, the General Accumulated Fund was valued at RM 487,272 whereas the Project Fund was valued at RM 528,292, bringing the total funds available for PHT at RM 1,015,564. The total income received for 2020 financial year was RM 33,555, whereas the expenditure for 2020 was RM 85,320. PHT charged out RM 19,895 for project-related costs, and received RM 3,741 in donations and RM 500 in government subsidies for 2020. The deficit accumulated for the 2020 financial year was RM 27,629.

Woo Yee Saik (L-27008) proposed for the financial report to be accepted, and the proposal was seconded by Leong Hon Yuen (L-27003).

5. Appointment of Auditors

Ben Wismen motioned for the reappointment of Al-JeffriDean for the 2021 financial year. The motion was accepted by all members with no objection.

6. Other Matters

6.1 Postponement of PHT Council Members election

Ben Wismen motioned, on behalf of the Council Members, to extend the current Council Members term for a year, and to conduct elections in the next AGM. This motion was raised in view of the lack of a mechanism to conduct elections effectively under the nationwide lockdown. The motion was proposed for unanimous acceptance by Ganesh (O-26041) and seconded by Yee Saik (L-27008)

6.2 Penang South Reclamation

Gaik Siang provided an update on status of the Penang South Reclamation, informing the meeting that advocacy efforts are now led by Penang Forum, and supported by groups such as Penang Tolak Tambak and Jaringan Ekologi dan Iklim (JEDI). She informed that new strategies have been taken, such as issuing press statements and information in social media platforms, in response to the Penang State Government filing a judicial review against the decision to revoke the previous EIA.

6.3 Fundraising

Lin Lee raised the topic of fundraising, indicating the need to organise a fundraising event to improve the funding resources of PHT. The meeting contributed to several ideas including a silent auction, organising Penang Story 3, and diversification of the existing walks and tours to include virtual tours.

6.4 Refurbishment of PHT façade

Trevor raised the need for PHT to refurbish the façade, as it looks run-down, and did not reflect the position of PHT as a lead in heritage preservation and conservation. The PHT council accepted the motion and will undertake the refurbishment process.

7. Adjournment

The Penang Heritage Trust Annual General Meeting 2021 adjourned at 4.50pm with a motion of thanks to the President and the council members.

1. President's Message

In view of the COVID-19 pandemic, in last year's AGM, we have decided to extend the council's term by another year without an election. Time flies and we are now in the 3rd year of pandemic and another election year.

With the easing of national SOPs, we have organised some events such as Chinese Brush Painting Workshop, as one of PAPA's introductory workshops, and a site visit to the Pinang Peranakan Mansion, in conjunction with the Chung Keng Kwee Bicentennial Celebrations. We also organised two sessions of talks during this period. However, we were still cautious about fully resuming our operations as we adapt to new national guidelines and global trends.

We have lost several of our PHT Living Heritage Treasures Award (LHTA) awardees over the past two years. This further reminds us of the need to better recognise, preserve and promote these intangible cultural assets and people before they are gone forever. Presently, we are calling for nominations to fill an available LHTA vacancy.

In Dec 2021, tenants at Burma Square received eviction notice from the owner, i.e. Penang Development Corporation (PDC) to be evicted by 1st of Jan 2022, to make way for redevelopment at the enclave. The mega development proposal development will see the demolition of repurposed government quarters, and replaced with two commercial and residential towers of up to 40-storeys within the area. The eviction notice and the proposed mega development were brought to PHT's attention and we decided to investigate and intervene.

We worked with the newly-appointed Heritage Commissioner to explore strategies to preserve these two blocks of heritage buildings from such unsympathetic redevelopment. In April 2022, Penang Heritage Trust (PHT) issued a press statement responding to the proposal to redevelop Burmah Square, and called for efforts to acknowledge and preserve this under-recognized heritage enclave outside the George Town World Heritage Zone. Burmah Square and the surrounding areas sit within a single, most intact, Art Deco-style enclave found in the country. Efforts should be made to preserve this enclave, and any plans for redevelopment and rejuvenation should be made in accordance to the genius loci of the place.

In May, we also heard of the completion of a revised Special Area Plan (SAP) for George Town World Heritage Site, and the consultant will arrange for a public display soon. While a revision is necessary to respond to the changing landscapes of George Town, it must also be context-specific and appropriate to meet the needs of our city. Strategies must also be put in place to de-risk the city from losing our UNESCO World Heritage Statues, as well as building a climate change-resilient city for now and the future.

I do hope that our members can fully support our efforts to preserve Burmah Square, and our efforts to influence the Replacement SAP to be more sympathetic to the UNESCO World Heritage Site, and our OUVs. I strongly encourage our members to take time to provide your feedbacks and comments when the SAP is displayed, and let our collective vision of a better George Town WHS be seen and heard.

I wish all of you are well and healthy during this pandemic time.

3. Membership

Penang Heritage Trust is a membership-based organisation, run largely based on the member subscriptions and support. There are five membership categories and four are open for subscriptions. The membership duration runs from the 1st January and ends on 31st December of the year, except for Life and Founding Members.

The total members of Penang Heritage Trust, as of 31st May 2022, stands at 254 members as compared to 251 members last year. The stagnant membership numbers may be attributed to the reduced number of activities carried out throughout the reporting period. While we managed to carry our several events such as site visit to Pinang Peranakan Museum and talks, most of the planned activities were postponed or cancelled due to the spike of COVID-19 pandemic cases in early 2022. The nationwide lockdown from May to August 2021 had also affected our ability to conduct outreach activities to grow the number of members of the Trust.

PHT would like to gently remind members to renew their membership at the start of the year, as regular membership expires as of 31st December of the said year. Members can also take opportunity to renew for three years or convert their Ordinary Membership to Life Membership for a one-time fee of RM 1,000.00, hence reducing the need to renew the membership annually.

4. Programmes and Projects

The following are programmes and projects carried out by Penang Heritage Trust throughout the year. The programmes and projects are developed based on the objectives of preserving and conserving our heritage assets for the next generation.

4.1 Living Heritage Treasures Awards (LHTA)

It is with sadness that we note the passing of LHTA Awardee 2006 traditional signboard carver Mr Kok Ah Wah in September 2021. Mr Kok was born in 1940 and had taken over his father's trade upon his passing. He worked on his own with the most basic of tools and achieved results entirely by hand including tracing and sandpapering. We regret his passing.

October 2021 saw the loss of yet one more immeasurable treasure in Penang, 2007 Awardee Noo Wan Dee Aroonratana, at the age of 98. Wan Dee, or Tok Wan as he was fondly called, was Penang's leading Thai Menora dancer, teacher and cultural practitioneer. It must have pleased him to know in his final months that Menora has been listed in UNESCO's Intangible Cultural Heritage List (2021). Menora is a community-based performance with deep cultural and social significance for the people of southern Thailand. Performances use regional dialects, music and literature to reinforce cultural life and social bonds among local people. For centuries, Menora has been performed in local community centres and at temple fairs and cultural events, and is passed on through training by masters in homes, community organizations and educational institutions. Here Wan Dee exemplified his expertise and passion

as he performed, taught and supervised for many decades in his Pulau Tikus community and other parts of Penang.

4.2 Penang Apprenticeship Programme for Artisans (PAPA)

PAPA has found that the most popular of its activities revolve around workshops. These have focused on weekend sessions. Due to recovery phases from the COVID-19 pandemic, physical workshops were conducted whenever possible.

We look to our members to provide more ideas as well as expertise and interest.

The following PAPA workshop was conducted for this reporting period:

1. Chinese Brush Painting Workshop – 28th November 2021

4.3 Site Visits

The site visits remained a feature within the PHT programmes as it brings members and the public to interesting places and sites and experts are engaged to deliver insider or lesser-known knowledge and facts to the audience.

1. Pinang Peranakan Mansion (5th December 2021)

This site visit was held in conjunction with Kapitan Chung Keng Kwee's bicentennial celebration, whereby 16 participants were treated to a special in-house tour of the Mansion. The visit was led by Clement Liang, and participants were shown various artefacts and art pieces, including a 13-fold mother-of-pearl inlaid screen that was presented to the Kapitan for his 75th birthday. The site visit ended with a special Hakkathemed tea, whereby participants were served 'lei cha' (a special tea) and sweet meats.

4.4 PHT Public Talks

Public talks were organised by PHT to promote awareness and disseminate interesting information on heritage related issues.

1. Beyond the Historic City: Rethinking Our Biocultural Heritage for a Pandemic Age (14th November 2021)

A total of 53 attendees took part in this virtual talk. Vice President of Penang Heritage Trust (PHT), Khoo Salma Nasution, shared innovative ways in rethinking Penang's outdoors and our biocultural heritage for tourism and liveability.

2. If the Sky were to Fall... (1st May 2022)

A total of 8 participants attended this talk by author Dr Gary Lit Ying Loong, a retired academic from Nanyang Technological University, at St. Xavier's Institution. Dr. Gary used the platform to introduce his book project, centred upon WWII, interlinked with values on heritage; compassion and civic consciousness; and preparation for a journey of discovery and learning in life. The talk ended with engaging conversations of the war, and the effects on people, place and social wellbeing.

5. Advocacy Projects

5.1 George Town Special Area Plan

PHT President Lim Gaik Siang continued to provide her feedback and inputs to the revised Special Area Plan for George Town World Heritage Site. In May 2022, it was announced that the revision exercise has been completed and will be publicly exhibited for comments and feedback.

5.2 Preservation of Burmah Square

PHT was alerted to the eviction and planned redevelopment in Burmah Square in December 2021. Upon investigation and discussions with stakeholders, PHT engaged the Penang Heritage Commissioner to explore strategies to preserve the enclave, as it is one of the most intact Art-Deco enclaves left in Malaysia. In April 2022, PHT issued a press statement highlighting the heritage significance of the area, and called for protection and preservation of the enclave. PHT office is currently managed by Mr. Chow Chee Kit, our PHT administrative executive since August 2020. Duty to Preserve Penang's Heritage outside the World Heritage Zone

Penang Heritage Trust calls on the Penang State Government to not sacrifice heritage enclaves outside of the George Town World Heritage Zone for development.

- Penang Heritage Trust (PHT) is responding to the proposal to redevelop Burmah Square, an under-recognized heritage enclave outside the George Town World Heritage Zone. The mega development proposal development will see the demolition of repurposed government quarters, and replaced with two commercial and residential towers of up to 40 storeys within the area.
- "The heritage charm on Penang lies not only within the George Town World Heritage Site, but is found in many other heritage enclaves such as Burmah Square", says Lim Gaik Siang, president of PHT. "Burmah Square and the surrounding areas sit within a single, most intact, Art Deco-style enclave found in the country. Efforts should be made to preserve this enclave, and any plans for redevelopment and rejuvenation should be made in accordance to the genius loci of the place".
- Art Deco refers to the architectural style popular from the 1930s- 1950s. The area bound by Jalan Larut, Jalan Burma, Jalan Pangkor and Jalan Sultan Ahmad Shah presents the highest collection of buildings built in this architectural style, and is the most intact enclave found anywhere in the country. Notable buildings built in this style include the Lee Kongsi, Wesley Methodist Church, Methodist Girl School, Penang Chinese Girls High School (all in Penang) and Pasar Seni (in Kuala Lumpur).
- The Art Deco style, characterized by sleek, streamlined looks and mixed use of materials including reinforced steel and Shanghai plaster, dominates the streetscape of Burmah Square and the surrounding developments. For example, the two rows of terrace houses along Jalan Phuah Hin Leong were designed by Danish architect B.M. Iversen, who then brought similar architectural style to Ipoh and Kuala Lumpur. Another architect who had left an indelible mark in Art Deco architecture is local-born Chew Eng Eam, whose impressive design is reflected on 31 Jalan Chow Thye, Lee Kongsi along Jalan Burma and two blocks of houses along Jalan Irrawadi. Similarly, London-born C.G. Boutcher had also contributed to the Art Deco movement in Penang, including the Penang Chinese Girls High School.

- "Penang State Government should lead by example in its commitment to preserve Penang's heritage diversity vis-à-vis development. This was done before, exampled by the innovative readaption and reuse of the Burmah Square quarters by Penang Development Corporation (PDC) – then led by Dato' Tengku Idaura Tengku Ibrahim, and should be continued now, especially in Penang's effort to position herself as destination of choice for foreign travelers and investments", continues Gaik Siang.
- "The proposed mega development on Burmah Square will have a domino effect on the surrounding buildings, putting pressure for future developments in the area. This development mistake have destroyed the heritage significance along Jalan Sultan Ahmad Shah and Jalan Macalister, and we do not wish for it to happen along Jalan Burma".
- "Further, the development plans submitted did not take into consideration of changes to traffic and living conditions of the larger area surrounding Burmah Square. The mega development will increase pressure on two major arteries leading in and out of George Town (Jalan Burma and Jalan Sultan Ahmad Shah), whereby these roads have already breached their traffic capacity on a daily basis".
- "Another basis of consideration is the suitability of such mega-developments in an enclave surrounded by heritage houses seated on a high water table area, and built without underground piling. We must be reminded that in 1980, the construction of Northam Court along Jalan Sultan Ahmad Shah (less than 100m from the proposed Burmah Square development) was suspended, demolished and rebuilt to present day MBF Tower, because it was tilting due to the shift in underground water resulting in unforeseen soil settlement. This massive construction will cause huge loss of underground water and the heritage buildings which are seated on these areas will have structural damages, as seen in Prangin Mall. Penangites will remember the severe damage caused to more than 370 prewar houses all around Prangin Mall by de watering in the excavation for 3 levels of underground car parks. Hammer piling for the foundations of tower blocks will also pose a severe threat to the integrity of the surrounding historic neighborhood".
- "PHT reiterates the call to the Penang State Government to revisit the development plans of Burmah Square, and seek a win-win solution that balances brown-fill redevelopment, especially in heritage-sensitive areas. The Government also has the responsibility to work hand-in-hand with heritage bodies, experts and organizations to further recognize heritage areas for preservation and rejuvenation for modern quality living in heritage zones".

Penang Heritage Trust

Treasurer's Report for the Year 2021

I am glad to present Penang Heritage Trust Treasurer Report for the Year 2021. Kindly refer to Auditor Financial Report for the year ended 31 December 2021 for full details.

In summary, our total Accumulated Fund of RM 980,838 is a combination of two funds namely:

- (1) General Fund of RM 478,970; and
- (2) Project Fund of RM 501,868

1. General Fund: Income and Expenditure

The total income received, without project surplus, was RM 25,149, as compared to RM 33,555 in year 2020. The total office and administration expenditures for the year is RM 72,645 as compared to RM 85,320 in year 2020. Total deficit before project surplus is RM 47,496 as compared to RM 51,765 in year 2020. [Kindly refer to Appendix A: Income and Expenditures for year 2021.]

A sum of RM 27,918 was charged out as administrative costs from the Project Fund, hence, the deficit for the year 2021, before the inclusion of donations, amounts to RM 19,578. This is compared against a deficit of RM 31,870 in year 2020. In 2021, PHT received public donations of RM 4,676 and government subsidy of RM 6,600, hence the net deficit for the year is recorded as RM 8,302. As compared to year 2020, we received RM 3,741 from public donations and RM 500 in government subsidies, resulting in a deficit of RM 27,629.

For 2021, total office and administration expenditures amounted to RM 72,645, and is broken down to payments to staff (67%), office maintenance (24%), and other miscellaneous cost (9%). This is compare against the breakdown of 58%, 34% and 8% respectively for the year 2020. Audit fee for current year is RM 2,000 and capture under miscellaneous cost. [Kindly refer to Appendix B]

2. Project Fund

Project fund is kept separate by PHT for the specific projects, and proceeds from the projects (including secretariat fees and reimbursements) are transferred into the General Fund after a particular project is closed, or partly withdrawn to reimburse the project costs (including office administration purposes). Please refer to Statement of Project Funds As At December 31, 2021 in page 5 of Auditors' Report. No new project fund was added throughout the reporting period.

3. Audited Financial Report

For the complete report with detailed breakdown on the respective costs and accounting factors, please refer to Audited Financial Report for PHT for year ended on 31st December 2021 as distributed.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of PERSATUAN WARISAN PULAU PINANG (PENANG HERITAGE TRUST) (2771/86), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2021, and the statement of income and expenditure, statement of project funds and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes, as set out on pages 3 to 12.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Society as at December 31, 2021, and its income and expenditure for the year then ended in accordance with applicable Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and the requirements of the Societies Act 1966 in Malaysia.

Basis for Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2021

1. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Persatuan Warisan Pulau Pinang - Penang Heritage Trust (PHT), established in 1986, is a membership-based non-government organization, open to all. It is wholly dependent on membership subscriptions, donations and grants to continue its work in promoting the conservation of Penang's heritage and working to save the island's many historical buildings. In addition, PHT organises cultural, educational and public awareness programmes for its members and the public.

2. DATE OF AUTHORISATION OF ISSUE

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the management trust members on June 08, 2022.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Trust have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in compliance with applicable approved accounting standards in Malaysia.

Depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment is computed on the straight-line method at the following annual rates based on their estimated useful lives:

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Trust reviews the carrying amounts of all its assets, other than inventories and financial assets, to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered impairment loss. If any such indication exists, impairment is measured by comparing the carrying values of the assets with their recoverable amounts. Recoverable amount is the higher of net selling price and value in use, which is measured by reference to discounted future cash flows. Recoverable amounts are estimated for individual assets or, if it is not possible, for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

An impairment loss is charged to the income statement immediately, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease to the extent of any available previously recognised revaluation surplus for the same asset.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent include cash in hand and at banks and deposits at call which have an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Receivables

Receivables are recognised and carried at original amount less allowance for any uncollectible amounts. Allowance for doubtful debts is made when collection of the full amount is no longer probable. Debts considered not recoverable are written off.

Payables

Payables are stated at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in future for goods and services received.

Employee Benefits

(i) Short term employee benefits

Salaries and bonus are accrued in the period in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Trust.

(ii) Retirement benefits

Defined contribution plan

Trust in Malaysia contribute to the Employees' Provident Fund, the national defined contribution plan. The contributions to the defined contribution plan are charged to the Statement of Income and Expenditure in the period to which they relate. Once the contributions have been paid, the Trust has no further payment obligations.

Income

Income is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Trust and the amount of the income can be measured reliably.

(i) Interest Income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis.

(ii) Members' Subscriptions Fee and Admission Fee

Subscriptions and admission fee are recognised on the receipt basis.

(iii) Project Income

Due to the nature of restricted use of the fund of each specific project, the income and expenditure for specific project is taken up into the projects' fund instead of recognising it in the Statement of Income and Expenditure. Upon obtained the consent of donors, 20% of the fund of certain projects was transferred (20% in 2020) to Statement of Income and Expenditure to finance the operation of the Society.

(iv) Merchandise and Other Income

Merchandise and other income are recognised based on receipt basis.
